graciously put us up for June and July. Courtney worked during the week at her company's global headquarters,


which was only about 20 minutes away from our house.

conversations that are often avoided because we don't want to offend anyone or cause anyone to be upset. However, we are doing a disservice to ourselves by not addressing these issues and having these hard conversations.

We are doing this because Jesus was the kind of man who had hard conversations with his disciples. Take for instance in the gospel of Mark when Jesus tells his disciples that he must undergo great suffering. Peter does not like the sound of this and becomes angry with Jesus for suggesting that he must suffer. Jesus calls out Peter and says, "Get behind me, Satan! For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things." (Mk. 8:33) Peter didn't understand that to be part of Jesus' movement, one must be willing to sacrifice and suffer for the benefit of those who are in need.

Jesus would confront issues of moral ambiguity. He would force people to examine their hypocrisy. Jesus wants us to live a life of consistency. One where our internal world and our external world match. Perhaps one of the most challenging ways he does this is by asking us to examine our role in the larger fabric of society. We are but one thread that makes up the whole tapestry, but our presence in the tapestry matters and we need to make sure that we understand how our choices, both conscious and unconscious, impact the people in the world around us.

Some of these conversation will be hard, but they are necessary for us to be honest about where we stand as Christians and as a church. Hopefully, as we examine ourselves and where we stand in relationship to Jesus' gospel, these hard conversations will inspire us to want to change and reach our fullest potential as humans and as Christians who are dedicated to creating God's kingdom on earth.

I'll see you on September 11 for the kick-off! I'm super excited to be back. It's going to be a great year!

Dear Ones,



I have always known this church was special. My mother tells the story of me running into the church nursery at just over a year old, calling for Lucy Reinhard, who was a year older and my favorite person in the nursery. (Many of you remember her parents, Juanita and

Saunders Reinhard.) I remember learning Bible verses in the **new** Christian Education wing from teachers like Grace Grey and putting pennies in a globe bank to "help the world". I remember walking home from high school and stopping in the office of Jim Eby, Associate Pastor for Christian Education. He would let me come in and bog him down with questions about my dating life, my future, and all sorts of things in between. There was Gordon Palmer, Director of Music, who directed Westminster Choir. He called on several of us as high school students to be rehearsal and Sunday morning accompanists, giving us confidence in our skill as pianists. He and Jim Eby developed in me a gift for leadership. They were the first to whisper "think about ministry". There was the congregation, many of them friends of my parents, who spoke to me and encouraged me and loved me through all the awkward and crazy years of growing up.

I have always known this church was special. This summer you all showed me your specialness once again. You asked how I was managing. You offered to help. You stepped up at the last minute. The Session had my back every step and so did the Personnel Committee as we dealt with a few tricky situations. You greeted me warmly when I preached. You welcomed the guest preachers. You offered suggestions gently and kindly. You were amazing, each of you in your own way.

I cannot thank you enough for the gift of your presence in my life this summer. Each one of you is incredibly special. In August, I turned 66. (I hope you are all saying "66!! I thought she was still in her 50s".) I will have to retire someday. I am not quite ready for that, yet. I do know, however, that whether an active Presbyterian minister or a retired Presbyterian minister, I will remember your specialness. The love of all of you and the saints that have gone before you follows me from the earliest moments of my life until now. I have always known this church was special. Thank you for showing that to me once again this summer.

APNC Update

On behalf of the Associate Pastor Nominating Committee, I wanted to provide an update regarding our progress. Since late May, we have been meeting regularly (10 meetings to date). Between meetings, committee members have been in constant communication and have been working hard on important tasks. I am proud of the efforts and time put forth by this committee and it's been an honor to serve in this role.

In our first three meetings, we clarified our mission, met with our Presbytery liaison, and solidified the administrative logistics surrounding our task. The presentation by our liaison was super helpful and answered many questions regarding the processes involved. Before posting a position and seeking candidates, our committee was tasked to conduct focus groups of stakeholders in our children and youth ministries.

In our next four meetings, we began the process of creating the focus groups, inviting participants, collecting their responses and discussing our objectives. During these meetings, we received great support from our focus group facilitator, Todd Hjermstad. Ultimately, we conducted five focus group sessions (four with parents of children in our programs and one with high school students who attended the mission trip in Puerto Rico). The purpose of the focus groups went beyond determining likely participation and involvement of families moving forward. We also probed the most important characteristics of children and youth programs for our church and the attributes for the leader of such programs.

In the next two meetings, we unpacked the focus group sessions. In addition to each of us reporting out our individual experiences sitting in on one of the focus groups, we also received a summary from Todd who, of course, was present for all the sessions and led the discussions.

Finally, in our most recent meeting (August 8), we solidified our recommendation that will shape our next steps and finished preparing our presentation for the Session meeting on August 14th. At that meeting, the Session unanimously approved our recommendation to find the best candidate regardless of whether or not they are ordained. Therefore, we will be creating and posting two separate Ministry Information Forms to seek out candidates. A special thanks goes to Michele Holifield and Mary Fino for helping reserve spaces and providing technological support throughout the ongoing process.

Thank You to our Amazing Garden Team!

If you are on the church grounds, you will notice how the facility bursts with color and beauty from our gardens. This beauty is made possible by a dedicated group of volunteers. Each spring the garden team works with the scout troop in mulching, trimming and planting to prepare the landscape for the growing season. In the fall, the scouts help winterize the gardens.

Each garden is tended by a dedicated gardener from the team.

Sara Thornton has cared for the Rose Court for several years and learned the skill of pruning roses so they are constantly in bloom from June to October.

The Dunton North Garden, from the Parlor windows to the front Sanctuary steps, has been cared for by the Spencers since they were part of the redesign team in 2012. Ross Spencer is responsible for the constant trimming and weeding required.

The Dunton South Garden, from the front Sanctuary steps to the Chapel, was redesigned in 2013 and Susan Schuffler works at planting and trimming perennials and annuals maintaining an English Garden appearance.

Sandy Meyer oversees the plot of natural plants on Eastman South of the Chapel stairs.

Tom Krigas hand trims and waters all of the boxwoods and plantings along Eastman and the corner of Vail.

Addressing Food Insecurity in Our Community

The Mission Committee along with other congregational committees work to address food insecurity in our community and the greater Chicago area. We regularly provide non-perishable food to the Wheeling Township Food Pantry, and our focus this year at MissionFactory for tweens was addressing food insecurity and our responsibility to address this growing issue. In addition, the following are some other ways that First Pres faithfully works to ensure that more people have access to healthy and nourishing meals.

Summer Suppers 2022

First Pres participated in the community-wide Summer Suppers over the past months. Churches and organizations throughout the community host evening meals for those who need assistance in stretching their budgets. We also provide essential items such as umbrellas, sunscreen, chapstick, lotions and other personal hygiene products. Since the pandemic, sites have provided meals both as a drive-up opportunity or the opportunity to come in from the heat and enjoy fellowship and a meal.

First Pres hosted Summer Suppers on the third Monday of each month. We hosted about 20 people each night and served another 30 meals through our drive-thru service. Coordinators for this year were Kim Hogan and Michele Holifield. We would like to thank everyone who donated time, funds and items needed for our meals and hospitality.

Loaves and Fishes Produce Market

If you come into the church building at Door 8, you cannot miss the bountiful garden growing. The Loaves and Fishes Garden provides fresh produce for Summer Suppers and PADS, as well as our weekly free fresh produce market. Each Wednesday from late July to early September, community members in need of access to affordable fresh vegetables are

invited to stop by the market. Congregation and community members are also welcome to donate from their home gardens. In addition to fresh vegetables, pesto, pickles and salsa made from the garden harvest are also available.

Mary and Martha's Lending Closet

Open since September of 2019, Mary and Martha's Lending Closet has a two-fold mission. First, by providing supplies for all types of gatherings, both big and small, we address sustainability by encouraging the use of sharing our things rather than accumulating. Through generous donations made by those who borrow from the closet, we are addressing food insecurity in the Chicago area. Over the past months, Mary and Martha's Lending Closet has contributed funds to the following organizations:

- 1. Loaves and Fishes Garden at First Presbyterian Church:
 The Loaves and Fishes Garden is a part of the Children's
 Ministry program at First Pres. Mary and Martha's
 Lending Closet provides funds for seeds and other
 supplies necessary to maintain the garden. Produce from
 the garden is distributed to the community free of charge
 on Wednesday evenings.
- Second Presbyterian Church Lunch Bag Program: The Second Presbyterian Church of Chicago is located on south Michigan Avenue. The program provides lunch Monday through Friday to the local community free of charge.
- 3. Gardeneers: Gardeneers works to give students in food-insecure neighborhoods access to healthy food through urban gardens and school garden education in Chicago. For more information on Gardeneers, follow the link, www.gardeneers.org/about/. First Pres is planning our next Service Saturday on October 15, at one of their gardens.

Team. Currently they are working on their initial paperwork and will begin training soon. All training is provided by RefugeeOne.

While the mentor team is busy training and preparing, our Make A Home Team will begin working to gather what September 2022

is needed to create a home for the family we welcome. Michele Holifield, Amy Hempleman and Amy Lumsden are currently working to build that team. If you have expressed interest in working with the Make a Home Team, you will be hearing from us soon. The whole congregation will also be hearing from the team as we will be looking for donations of items to fill the home.

Dr. Kaasch will be evaluating Isaiah, Jeremiah, Daniel and Ezekiel and asking a series of important questions: Do they prophesy? If they do, what are they prophesying? Has it come to pass? Is it about Jesus? How in the world do we attempt to read these very complex and strange writings?


These are the major 'Ketuvim' of the Old Testament. Although many people assume Ketuvim translates to *Prophets*, it simply means *Writings*. During this 10-week course, we will discover what is written, what it means and what is said that it means. It will be a very interesting ride that will forever change the way you read the prophets.

Middle School

El Guacio's commitment to service, hospitality, and growing with their community was a profound reminder of the work that we carry with us—whether we're in places like Puerto Rico, or in Arlington Heights.


Children's Ministries Looks Ahead To Fall



Summer Session Notes

Session Summer Highlights from the approved minutes from the June 12, 2022 Meeting of Session and unapproved minutes from the August 14, 2022 Meeting of Session. Note instead of a regular stated meeting in July, Session held a Special Meeting of Session.

The Session approved the recommendation from the APNC to search for a "unicorn" by conducting two simultaneous searches to find either an ordained minister or Youth Director for the open position in Youth Ministries. The APNC will move forward with the next step in the process to create two separate MIFs for Session approval.

The Session approved the Mission Committee's motion to display two Pride Flags in the flowerpots outside door 1 annually during the month of June.

The Session approved the Worship Music and Sacrament Committee's motion before Session to hold one service at 10:30 am in the Sanctuary on Sunday, December 25, 2022 and one service at 10:30 am in the Chapel on Sunday, January 1, 2023.

The Session approved change in date of September Session meeting from September 11, 2022 to September 18, 2022.

The Session approved call for Congregational Meeting on September 25, 2022 for the purpose of electing new officers.

The Session approved by consensus that the Admin & Finance Committee move forward with creation of a Task Force from within our membership to consider the potential, viability, and appropriateness of selling the parking lot on the East side of Dunton and exploring alternative revenuegenerating options for the CE Wing.

Mark Smith, Chair of APNC along with Kelly Dean and Brian Landwehr, members of APNC, gave an excellent presentation summarizing the work they conducted over the summer. Todd Hjermstad was hired as a professional focus



group facilitator to conduct five focus groups to gather data on the leadership needs for the First Pres Youth Program. The APNC presented Todd's report along with the APNC work. The APNC presented its recommendation to Session and Session approved. Session thanked the APNC for their hard work, dedication, and for the new work they will begin now with Session's approval of the recommendation.

Lindsey Landwehr-Fasules, Board of Trustees President, updated Session on the construction project of the Hallway and Chapel and answered questions.

Gary Gehm, chair of Admin & Finance reported on financial status and proposed creation of a Task Force, which Session approved.

Steve Olszewski, Chair of Task Force on Restructuring the Financial Foundation of First Pres, gave a status report and shared next steps.

Liz Thompson, chair of All-Church Nominating Committee reported she found a replacement for Deacon Stephanie Levinsky who had resigned.

Cynthia Hiskes, Chair of Personnel Committee, reported for the Personnel Committee.

The next meeting of Session is Sunday, September 18, 2022 in the Parlor at 11:30 am.

UPDATE ON THE CE BUILDING

Over the summer the trustees and facilities team worked to continue improvements and updates in the CE Building. The building was originally constructed in 1961. While some updates have occurred in the past 60 years, it has become

increasingly important that we address some immediate needs.

- The domestic water lines are being replaced throughout the CE Building. Over the past several years we have experienced many leaks causing some damage to ceilings and floors.
- The lower level of the CE building adjacent to Fellowship Hall has a new look. A polished concrete floor, new ceiling and new lighting was installed during the month of August.
- An original heating system in Fellowship Hall will be replaced. Replacing this heating coil will allow us to also add a cooling unit providing air conditioning to Fellowship Hall.

We look forward to sharing with you other updates to the CE building that will provide a welcoming and hospitable gathering place for the congregation and wider community. If you have any questions concerning these or other projects in the building, please contact Michele Holifield.

New Bulk Permit Significantly Reduces our Postage Cost

You may have noticed we have returned to mailing *The Chimes* monthly. We have received feedback from many of you that getting this in the mail is much improved over receiving it digitally (you are actually reading it!). We can do this in a low-cost way because we applied for and received a non-profit bulk mail permit with the post office last year. The current first-class postage rate is \$.60 for

year. The current first-class postage rate is \$.60 for a piece of mail, but we only pay about \$.12 a unit with our permit. That means it costs us about \$67 a month to mail *The Chimes* with the permit vs. a cost of \$336 if we were to mail first-class. That is an

annual savings of \$2,690. We also use this permit beyond *The Chimes*. Just last month, we mailed a reminder about the per capita apportionment and used our bulk mail permit. It cost us \$70 to send the reminder letter and we have already received an additional \$3,600 towards our per capita

apportionment for 2022. Despite being in a digital world, one of the most effective ways for us to communicate with you is through "snail mail". The bulk mail permit allows us to do so in a very cost-effective way.
