From the Pastor Emerging Patterns

If you were here for my sermon on September 11, you probably know that we stayed with Christine and Charlie Rowley. They are voracious readers with numerous bookshelves around their house. Every so often, when I needed a break from writing, I would pick up a book to read, one of which was about

severe volcanic eruptions throughout the history of the earth.

Perhaps one of the most catastrophic that impacted humans occurred around 70,000 B.C. A volcano called Toba, located on the island of Sumatra in Indonesia, erupted. This eruption ejected roughly 650 miles of vaporized rock into the air. It is the largest volcanic eruption humans

have ever experienced. The human population, which was concentrated solely in Africa at this point in history, plummeted to less than 5,000 people. Humans were on the brink of extinction.

There was so much ash, dust and vapor in the air that Toba likely dimmed the sun for six

years, disrupting seasonal rains and choking off streams. Berries, fruits, trees and African game became scarce, causing the homo sapien population to plummet, which raises an interesting question: How was this small group of humans able to survive this global catastrophe where others perished?

It's not that they were the strongest or the fastest. In this instance, they were the smartest. As the food supply ran short, they moved swiftly towards the coastal regions, whereas others were waiting around to see if the food supply would recover, which it didn't. This small group of humans could see a pattern that others could not see—the changing weather from the volcanic ash was going to fundamentally alter their habitat and food supply.

This may have been the first time in history that the human mind was the most advantageous survival tool on the planet. Those who survived this mass extinction are the proverbial Adam and Eves from which we descend. Their genes are the basis of our genes and they have something pretty spectacular built into their genes that they passed onto us—the ability to survive under incredibly harsh conditions. Indeed, it would seem that the more difficult the conditions, the more our minds are prepared to engineer a way around the problem we are facing.

Reading about this event felt serendipitous. While my

family was travelling over in Europe during my sabbatical, we experienced the heatwave that was engulfing much of the northern hemisphere. Florence, Italy was where the heat was the worst. During our time there,

Florence experienced the hottest days ever recorded. One of the issues with Florence is that there are no trees in the city, which means there is no foliage to deflect the direct sunlight. Combine this with the cobblestone streets that literally absorb all of the heat



New Addition to the Organ

Over the last 15 years, we have made several tonal additions to the organ. This summer we had our latest addition, a new

16-foot Contre Trompette (French trumpet) stop, installed in the swell division of the organ. This new addition adds strong fundamental reed tone to the organ. We sourced the pipes from a Schantz organ from the early 1980's that is undergoing a rebuild. Because our organ is a Schantz built in 1972, the pipe work blends seamlessly in our tonal palette. The used pipe work came at significant savings to new pipe work. This addition was made possible by memorial gifts in memory of Betty Lou Bukowski.



This almost completes the tonal additions to the swell organ. We have one remaining addition, the bottom octave of the Oboe, and the swell division will be complete. If you would like to hear the new stop or have interest in helping us complete the Oboe, please reach out to Chris Urban. We are truly blessed to have such a fine pipe organ at First Pres to enhance our worship services and concerts.



Stephen Ministry

Christ caring for people through people

Stephen Ministry is a program that provides one-to-one care for those going through significant life transitions. A Stephen Minister is one who has the natural gifts of compassion and care and adds about fifty hours of training to those natural gifts. This provides them with the ability to build a confidential relationship with someone who is experiencing a life transition – a serious illness, a move, a new disability,

a divorce, children leaving home, a marriage are among the things that are considered a significant life transition.

A Stephen Minister will meet with you once a week for approximately one hour. They will listen, offer guiding

questions, and provide support. The relationship can last anywhere from three months to five years. It depends on the situation. This is not meant to take the place of therapeutic counseling or other interventions recommended. It is simply an additional level of support offered from one Christian to another in a time of need.

Stephen Ministry came to First Presbyterian Church of Arlington Heights in the late 70's under the direction of Dr. Jim Martin. Following the death of Jim Martin and under the leadership of successive pastors, the Stephen Ministry program dwindled. However, when Alex Lang was called to serve our church there was a strong desire to rebuild our Stephen Ministry program. Pastor Judy Hockenberry, Beth Drost, and the late Larry Hayes traveled to Pittsburgh, PA for leadership training in August of 2015. We trained our first group of Stephen Ministers in 2016 and our second group finished training in 2018. We currently have 10 well-trained Stephen Ministers. During this time, Ray Powers, having received training as a Stephen Minister, was trained

as a Stephen Leader.

Covid had a big impact on our ministry, since it is truly a ministry of presence, and we simply weren't allowed to be physically present to many people during 2020 and 2021. We are now re-energizing our

Stephen Ministry program and we want to make sure that you know that Stephen Ministers are here for you – any of you and all of you!

If you are going through a life transition or struggling with an issue and you'd like someone you can trust with confidentiality to listen as you talk through and work through this transition, call Pastor Judy at church. She will be happy to find a Stephen Minister to accompany you on your journey. This program is completely free of charge and completely confidential.

and the temperature on the ground was around 110 degrees Fahrenheit.

Florence was hardly unique. Temperatures soared in countries all around Europe. Three rivers in France went completely dry for the first time ever. In India temperatures topped out at 121 degrees causing thousands of deaths from heat stroke. Clearly, there is a pattern emerging that threatens to fundamentally alter our habitat and food supply.

I think most people can feel that mother earth is out of equilibrium. There is an imbalance. Rather than the right amount of heat or the right amount of rain, there's either too much or too little. All of this has forced me to ask the question: Are we approaching another Toba event that threatens the long-term survival of our species?

Humans are notoriously bad at addressing these existential questions because we feel powerless to do anything about them. With nearly 8 billion people on the planet, my actions feel insignificant. Indeed, you are but one drop in an ocean of people. However, what the Christian faith teaches us is that you must always take into account how your actions impact the larger community around you. As a Christian, you are challenged to individually sacrifice for the benefit of the community. This type of sacrifice is, of course, what Jesus does for us and it is the example by which we are called to live our lives.

Jesus' message is that your sacrifice for the larger community does matter. Rather than view your life as but a drop in the ocean, Paul tells us that we are part of a larger body. I think of each human as one cell in a much larger organism. The organism can't survive without you. You play a critical role in keeping the whole organism alive. In other words, you are a critical part of bringing this planet back into equilibrium. Your actions and sacrifices matter for the long-term survival of the coming generations.

I was inspired to write this article because Christine and Charlie Rowley, the family with whom we lived, hand planted 5000 tree seedlings on their property. Nobody asked them to do this. They didn't tell me this information to brag. I asked them what they were doing over the weekend and they told me they were going to finish their project. Their example is what all of us need to be doing for mother earth. Her resources have given us such a rich and remarkable life. Now we have to make sure that we are using that same ingenuity that created all of our modern comforts to give back, because when mother earth can breath easy, so can

Therefore, I implore each of you to take your Christian duty seriously. Ask yourself how you can sacrifice what you have to benefit this planet that has given us life. Together, if each one of us is willing to take a step in the right direction of helping the earth to better cope with our presence, then I believe we can reverse these alarming trends and create a livable earth for future generations.

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Annual Collection for Firman Community Services & Christopher House



RESTORATIVE FAITH


Wednesdays through December 14 7:00 pm / Sanctuary / Rev. Alex Lang

Highlights from the unapproved minutes from the September 18, 2022 meeting of Session.

Session approved the Mission Committee and Stone Catchers' motion to adopt the Cook County Against Hate Pledge as follows:

I/we pledge to unite against hate and join with my/our community to welcome all people regardless of their race, religion, ethnicity, age, gender identity, sexual orientation, disability, class, or other background.

I/we pledge to:

- Actively learn from those with lived experiences that are different from mine
- Question hateful acts when I/we see or hear them
- Educate myself/ourselves on how to safely interrupt hate
- Support efforts towards social justice
- Inspire others to take this pledge
